The foam must be white, clean and have a #6 imprinted on it. Foam peanuts may be taken to a local mailing service for reuse. A Rash of Rashes

We haven't had too many cases of unexplained rashes, but we do want to let you know that one of our students was diagnosed with Fifth Disease this week. According to the Clackamas County Health Department, the symptoms of Fifth Disease include bright red cheeks, blotchy, lace appearing rash which fades and recurs, runny nose, sore throat, headache, & low grade fever. This is not an "excludable" disease, but it is contagious for one week after the onset of symptoms. We have been advised in the past that pregnant women coming in contact with this disease should notify their doctor.

In addition, please remember that State law does not allow students to bring medicine to school, including *seemingly* harmless items such as cough drops, lactaid pills, inhalers, etc. If your child needs any kind of medicine at school, please contact the office for the appropriate forms that we are required to obtain.

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Clackamas County Offers Three Percent Home Repair Loans

The Clackamas County Community Development Division is accepting applications for its Home Repair Loan Program.

Eligible people are those living in Clackamas County who are buying or own the home that needs to be repaired. Property taxes must be current and the loan applicants must be living in the home.

Yearly gross income guidelines are as follows: 1

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person \$32,050; 2 persons \$36,600; three persons \$41,200; four persons \$45,750. The amount of the loan depends on the repairs that need to be done and the amount of equity in the property.

The loans are for furnace replacement, exterior repairs or complete repairs.

County housing representatives will assist throughout the construction process. Loans are available up to \$35,000 at a rate of three percent interest with deferred payment and monthly payment plans.

Beavercreek Boosters Past, Present and Future

Here begins Part I of an anticipated three part history of the Beavercreek Boosters from past to present.

Sometime in the late 1970's, several people in Beavercreek, who were business men and prominent leaders of the community and some of their friends, decided to get together and enjoy each others company over food and drink. Perhaps someone thought it would be a good idea to invite more members of the community to join in and celebrate the last get together of the summer. In 1979 the



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Beavercreek Boosters Club was formed and the membership of this organization held the first Beavercreek Bust. Through the early years the "Bust" grew to include many activities that helped the community achieve recognition and provide entertainment that would attract people from far beyond the boundaries of Beavercreek. Some of the projects that were put together by the Boosters for the BUST included Horse Playdays, Sheep Dog Trials, Children's activities, Arts & Crafts and food vendors, Beer Tent with live entertainment, Beavercruise (Car Cruise-in), Poker and Bingo games. As each year passed the BUST grew to include more and more elaborate activities. This required a lot of time, money and energy to put together. In addition to the Beavercreek Bust, members got involved in other year-round activities. The Boosters along with the Beavercreek Lions and Fire Department delivered Christmas Toy and Food Baskets to needy families in the Beavercreek area. Other

activities included Miss Beavercreek Pageant, annual Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony and making donations to non-profit organizations in the community. In order to achieve status as a non-profit organization themselves, the Boosters had to incorporate and obtain a goal to benefit the community. In 1983 the Boosters became incorporated with the goal to purchase a parcel of land for a community park. As more people through the years became interested in the Boosters, membership grew and new members brought new ideas to help the community and raise funds to reach the goal to purchase land. Unfortunately, so did the price on available land grow. *Here ends Part I. Submitted by Ben Boffard*

Clackamas County Dog Control Hosts National Tag and 3rd Annual Amnesty Day Saturday, April 6

Clackamas County will host the Third Annual Amnesty Day from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 6. The event is part of a nationwide effort to get dogs licensed and vaccinated.

Licenses are required by both state and county law for dogs' six months of age or older. As part of this observance the agency will waive all administrative late fees on unpaid or past due dog licenses if the licenses are purchased at their normal price of \$10 for spay/neutered dogs (presentation of veterinarian's spay/neuter certificate is required) and \$25 for fertile dogs. Amnesty Day is only available to those that appear personally at the event.

For the convenience of the public local veterinarians will be administering rabies vaccinations at the shelter for the nominal fee of \$5 per dog. Because a current rabies vaccination must be presented at the time of licensing, persons with unvaccinated dogs will be able to vaccinate and license their dog in "one-stop". Those owning dogs that are presently vaccinated should bring

the veterinarian's certificate of rabies vaccination.

Dog Owners living within the city limits of Lake Oswego, West Linn and Gladstone should note that they must buy their licenses at their respective city halls. Such owners may still have their dogs vaccinated for rabies during tag day at the county shelter. The shelter will be also be open for viewing of adoptable dogs.

The Dog Control Shelter is located at 2104 Kaen Rd., Oregon City, next to the jail and Juvenile Department.

The event will also include pet product vendors, Dog Control Manager Dog Wash (\$5 per dog) or dipping for \$2 per dog and an agility training course.

Clackamas County Dog Control's primary funding source is from licensing of dogs and helps support animal rescue, animal adoptions, emergency veterinary care for strays, shelter operations, lost and found services and the website among other services. 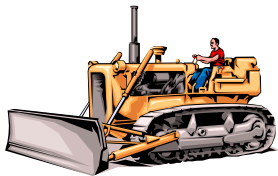
The guest speakers were Pat Detloff, Clackamas County Sheriff and John Foote, Clackamas County District Attorney.

Clackamas County District Attorney's Office Awarded \$120,000

The Clackamas County District Attorney's Office has been awarded a \$120,000 grant from the U.S. Bureau of Justice to prosecute cases involving violent and other related crimes committed with guns. In Clackamas County the seed money will be used to hire one prosecutor for three years.

Clackamas County District Attorney John Foote said the grant has three main purposes. They include:

- Assigning assistant prosecutors to deal directly with firearm-related crimes.
- Improving the long-term issue of firearm-related crimes
- Deterring firearm-related violent crimes through swift prosecution.

"This new federal grant will allow the Clackamas County District Attorney's Office to continue consistently and aggressively prosecuting gun violence in Clackamas County," Foote said. Clackamas County to Submit Three-Year Community Safety Levy to Voters May 21

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners has voted to place a community safety levy on the May 21 ballot. The three-year levy is expected to yield about \$13.1 million the first year, \$13.9 the second and \$14.6 the third year for an estimated total of \$41.6 million over the life of the levy. The proceeds will be used by the County Sheriff, District Attorney, Juvenile Department and Community Corrections to maintain current services. The money would also add 115 beds at the county jail.

The levy would be paid for by property owners at a rate of 59 cents per \$1,000 in assessed value. The average assessed value of a home in Clackamas County is \$165,000. The owner of such a home would pay about \$97 per year for three years if the levy passed.

The levy request is a result of monetary shortfalls in the operation of the County's community safety programs and from an identified need for more beds at the jail. The Board of County Commissioners voted to submit the three-year levy during a public hearing held March 14.
