A funeral mass was held at 11:00 a.m. Monday, June 7, 2004, in the St. Philip Benizi Catholic Church for Ilene "Lois" Stevens who died June 2nd at the age of 78.

Ilene "Lois" Stevens was born on September 1, 1925, to Daniel and Kathleen Leary as the last of five children in the town of Vernon, Canada. During her far too brief 78 years on this earth, she created more beauty and touched more lives than one can imagine.

Lois moved to Oregon in 1928 and graduated from Roosevelt High School in the class of '44. While waiting for the love of her life to return from the war, she worked in the shipyards and went to school. She eventually became a member of the first four-year graduating class from St. Vincent's School of Nursing, University of Portland. Although she only practiced her profession a short while, her skills served her well throughout the years as a mother of eight, surrogate mother to countless calves (as she taught her children to milk the

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family cow) and foals, piglets, rabbits and pets and whatever else the children dragged home. Lois also excelled in music, playing the organ at church and the piano at home.

So, how does one measure the value of a life? Is it by the fifty-six year marriage to the same man? Is it by the five sons she has nurtured and loved who can fix anything, build everything, are friends to everyone they meet and are a vital part of the community where they live? Is it by the three daughters who achieved advanced college degrees; a teacher, a healthcare giver and an administrator? Do you count the fact that Lois could preserve anything that grew (and did), could crochet and knit amazingly large sweaters and cooked over 60,000 meals in her lifetime (and hated to cook)? Do you count her annual vegetable gardens and the rose beds that always disappointed her, or the fact that she prided herself in never having owned a dishwasher?

“Beavercreek Oregon a History

Through the Looking Glass”

This is Part VII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his remembrances.

-- THE GENERAL MERCHANDISE STORE (cont.) --

Fresh meat was not a big item because most people raised their own animals and slaughtered and put up their own fresh meats, although Mr. Jacob Weidner operated a slaughter house on what is now the Carl Steiner place. Mr. Weidner also went directly to the farms and did custom work for the farmers. At a later date his grandson, Albert Weidner, ran a slaughter house just across the creek and south of where the Welsh Church stands. At different times there were meat routes run by Albert Weidner and Mr. Ferris Mayfield. And still later, the slaughter house was taken over by Mr. Herbert Steiner.

Neither did the store carry fresh milk. This was because people had their own cows and the few who didn't were able to buy or trade something with their neighbors for milk. There were no laws or regulations prohibiting this bartering as there have been for many years now.

Everyone it seemed had a flock of chickens and the store bought some eggs for resale, but sold very few over the counter. There was rather brisk competition in the buying of eggs. This was probably because the women usually ran their households, in part at least, with the money they received from the sale of the eggs. They would call Oregon City stores to find out what they were paying; no doubt to have some leverage for bartering with us. This was not much of a problem though. The only time they would offer a better price was when they were short of eggs for resale over the counter and they usually offered a better price in trade than if they took the cash. At Beavercreek we

maintained one price whether in cash or trade; however, most people did trade the eggs out.

We were often called asking the price of eggs and on one occasion a customer complained about the difference between what we were paying and the quoted price in the market page of the Oregon Journal. After spending considerable time explaining, or trying to, this young, cheeky clerk suggested that maybe she should sell them to the Oregon Journal. She was emphatic when she came back with, "You know very well that the Journal doesn't buy eggs!"

Eggs came to the store in all kinds of containers. Some would place a layer of oats in the bottom of a wooden box or a pail, then put another layer of oats, and alternating layers of oats and eggs until full. Some used shorts (feed grain) or bran for the same purpose. There were some who used the regular egg crates, which were much easier to handle, but the rough roads and chuck holes took their toll for many were broken. Removing the eggs from those packed in oats, bran, or whatever, was time-consuming because it was necessary to run the fingers through the oats over and over again to get the last egg.

It didn't happen often but there were a few instances when people brought in eggs that obviously had been laid by a hen who had stolen her nest out. One can never be sure if the incident were an accident or deliberate but it caused embarrassment to the store if perchance one of those eggs were sold to a customer. And of course, if one was broken the resulting aroma became very hard to live down. The candling of eggs was not in the law at that time.

The tea department consisted of three canisters, one of which was marked "Spiderleg", another "Gunpowder", and another "English Breakfast". These

canisters were made of metal and each equipped with a sort of roll-up cover. There was also one very popular brand packed in a very heavy tin or lead foil and was called "Blue Ribbon". The Welsh people loved it.

Flour was sold by the barrel. A barrel was four, 49-pound sacks. The smaller 5 and 10 pound bags were not even thought of then as most people baked their own bread. The yeast used then were the dry cakes and the prevailing brands were "Magic Yeast" and "Yeast Foam" and were made by the same manufacturer. Their advertising always said, "Just the same except the name". The Magic always outsold the other and women swore that they could make better bread with Magic. Some of our customers came long distances. They often would be going to Oregon City but would leave produce such as eggs, grains, potatoes, wool, dressed pork or veal, a coop of chickens, or whatever. On one occasion, a Mr. Fred Moehnke, who lived at Elwood, which must have been ten or twelve miles beyond Beavercreek, met the writer as he was driving to Oregon City and gave the writer a real bad time because he was not at the store when he drove through there before 7:30 a.m. He had, however, left some produce items on the porch of the store for me to take care of. We often have wondered what time Mr. Moehnke would have had to get up to get his chores done and to be in Beavercreek before opening time with a team of horses and wagon!

CCC Offers Unique Music Technology Program

Students seeking a career in the music production industry can gain core skills through a new certificate program at Clackamas Community College. The State Board of Education approved the Music Technology Professional Certificate at its April meeting. The program at CCC is the only one of its kind in Oregon.

In addition to teaching basic music technology skills through the use of computers and digital recording equipment, the new program will provide students with entry strategies on how to get into the music production business. Students will also have opportunities to meet and network with successful music industry professionals.

Courses in the program include audio recording, midi sequencing/sampling, recording studio internships, music business, career exploration, and a sampling of more traditional music courses such as music history and fundamentals. Popular music software programs

taught at CCC include ProTools, CUbase, Reason, Finale and Fruity Loops.

Music technology is one of the fastest growing parts of the music industry. 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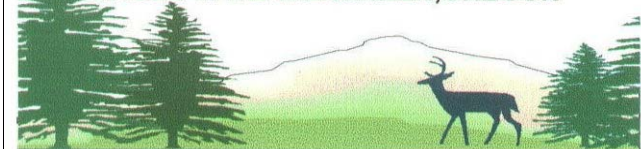

CCC Athlete Makes Record-Setting Javelin Toss

Clackamas Community College freshman Casey Kauffman set three records when he threw the javelin 273 feet 6 inches at the community college championships May 28. His throw automatically

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qualified him for the U.S. Olympic track and field team trials in July this summer.

Kauffman's toss set the record for the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges at the meet in Spokane. It was the farthest toss in NWAACC championship history, and it was the farthest throw ever made by an NWAACC athlete.

Kauffman isn't the only athlete with ties to Clackamas Community College at the Olympic trials in Sacramento. CCC graduate and pole vault champion Becky Holliday will compete. Javelin thrower Trina Rogers will compete as well. Both women hold the records for junior colleges in their sports. David Lemen will compete in the decathlon. Lemen, who attended CCC from 1999-2000, holds the junior college record in the decathlon.

PGE Commemorates 115 Years of Service June 3rd Anniversary Celebration at PGE Park July 4th

Portland General Electric (PGE) turned 115 years old June 3, 2004, which also marks the day the company entered the record books with the first long-distance electricity transmission in the nation's history.

To claim that distinction, on the evening of June 3, 1889, PGE (then known as Willamette Falls Electric) transmitted electricity from its sole hydroelectric plant on the Willamette River in Oregon City to downtown Portland 14 miles away. Later, in 1895, PGE built a second power plant at Willamette Falls, and it remains the company's oldest plant, which is still operating today.

After its start in the record books, PGE has celebrated several other innovations along the way. For instance, in 1907, the company placed its electric distribution lines underground in downtown Portland. In 1958, PGE started its largest-ever hydroelectric power plant, the Pelton Dam on the Deschutes River. Later, in 1966, the company completed its 194-mile section of the Pacific Intertie, an electrical highway that links the Pacific Northwest and states in the Southwest to allow for seasonal electricity exchanges between the regions.

PGE, together with its customers, also encountered and overcame significant weather-related challenges throughout the years. In the winter of 1916, for instance, PGE's linemen were inundated with repair work caused by a series of snow and ice storms, followed by floods, that were said to be the worst in Portland's recorded history at the time. But the largest weather event to test the mettle of PGE employees came from the hurricane force winds of the Columbus Day storm Oct. 12, 1962, which interrupted service to



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98 percent of PGE's customers. More recently, the wind storm, rain and floods of 1996 and the ice and snow events of late 2003 and January 2004 are still fresh in the memories of many.

In celebration of PGE's 115th anniversary and the 125th anniversary of the electric light bulb, PGE is hosting an anniversary party at PGE Park this July 4, 2004. In addition to a rousing game of baseball between the Portland Beavers and Edmonton Trappers, the event features fireworks, music and giveaways, including scores of electric toasters and irons (a reflection of the earliest appliances PGE promoted). Plus, the first 2,500 event attendees receive coupons for free compact fluorescent light bulbs, courtesy of the Energy Trust of Oregon, Fred Meyer and General Electric. Tickets may be ordered at TicketMaster.com or by calling 503-224-4400.

There were also updates from members who are members of the Clackamas County Committee for Citizen Involvement and the Metro Committee for Citizen Involvement on what is currently happening in these committees.

There was also discussion about our roads and the lack of a shoulder for pedestrian traffic. The road discussed in detail was Ferguson Rd. There is a lot of traffic that uses Ferguson instead of Beavercreek Rd for through traffic. The road is a straight shot, but has very dangerous dips along its course. There is concern about the speed of the vehicles using the road and the lack of a pedestrian walkway for individuals to get out of the way of the traffic.

Single Vehicle Accident Takes Out BCT Hub

At approximately 8:30 p.m. on the evening of June 9, 2004, a 1986 Chevrolet S10 Truck, driven by John Reck, age 36, went out of control and rolled over on Leland Road about 1/4 mile E. of S. Leslie. The accident totaled one of Beaver Creek Telephones Hubs and Cable Boxes. The truck was also totaled in the incident. Apparently Mr. Reck did not have insurance.

Mr Reck, a resident of Beavercreek, was alone in the car at the time. There was a witness to the accident who detained Mr. Reck until the police arrived.

It was determined that Mr. Reck was under the influence at the time of the accident and had been driving in a reckless manner when the accident happened. At the time of the incident Mr. Reck's driving privileges were suspended. He was taken to OHSU by ambulance.

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Mr Reck is facing charges of: DUII, criminal mischief, reckless driving, driving suspended and hit & run property damage. The case will be submitted to the grand jury.

Driver Narrowly Misses Serious Injury

On the afternoon of May 30, 2004, a green 1995 Toyota Camry was involved in an altercation between itself, a fence and some boulders. The accident took place on S. Beavercreek Rd near Tioga Rd.

The driver of the vehicle, Roger Delay, a resident of Oregon City, age 71, narrowly avoided serious injury.

When help arrived his vehicle was on its side leaning against a tree. The driver's side tires were about three feet off the ground. The driver was standing inside the car out of the drivers side window. His hand was injured.

Mr. Delay did not remember the crash. He thought that he may have fallen asleep. Mr. Delay was also short of breath. He was transported to OHSU by ambulance.

After examination of the crash scene it was determined that the vehicle had been travelling East on S. Beavercreek Road. The vehicle did not turn for the



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corner and continued in a straight line. There were no visible skid marks on the roadway. The car left the roadway prior to the driveway for about ten to fifteen feet before it hit the driveways culvert. It then went across the driveway, through a six-foot cyclone fence and hit two large boulders. Both of the boulders were moved several feet from the impact. The vehicle then came to rest against a tree, that was ten to fifteen feet from the boulders.

A piece of the cyclone fence railing went through the windshield on the passenger side. There was about three feet of the tubing inside the car. The vehicle had extensive front end damage to the grille and the hood area. Both airbags were deployed. The vehicle had to be towed.

Man Arrested for DUII

On June 4, 2004, Leonard Geislinger, age 41, of Millwaukie, drove his 2003 Ford F-250 Pickup off S. Beavercreek Road. The truck rested on it's side. When authorities arrived he was swaying and had an odor of an alcoholic beverage on him. He failed field sobriety tests and was arrested for DUII. Bail was set at \$7500.00.

North Clackamas Aquatic Park Celebrates 10th Birthday with 10 events, 100 Days of Summer

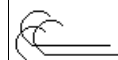
