Forest Hall Dedication

A sometimes frustrating, but well supported community project culminated Sunday, June 3, with the dedication of the new Forest Hall at Hopkins Demonstration Forest south of Oregon City.

More than 100 project donors attended the event in the one-story wood frame building that will serve as a classroom and meeting place at the 140-acre tree farm owned and managed by non-profit Forests Forever Inc. The 2,400-square foot structure was completed this spring at a cost of more than \$365,000 financed by donations from more than 200 individuals, families, businesses, foundations and others. The event was held to show appreciation for their help.

"It's been a long time coming," Ken Everett, project manager and executive director of Forests Forever, said of delays in completing construction. Planning began in 2007, but the economic recession slowed fundraising, he noted, and obtaining assorted permits from Clackamas County took longer than expected. "With all of the support and donations from so many people, it was possible."

The dedication featured a woodsy version of a grand opening ribbon cutting. Ilene Waldorf, whose family was a major donor, yielded brush cutting loppers to cut through a fir bough stretched between entrance posts. Waldorf, the daughter of Molalla area woodland pioneer Clyde Ramsey, told the crowd of wanting a place to display his historic logging equipment. But after talking with Everett in 2006, they agreed on a versatile building for learning and meetings. Some of the logging machinery will rest on overhead shelves.

Mike Bondi, Oregon State Extension Regional Administrator and one of the Forests Forever founders, thanked the many donors and helpers, giving the biggest pat on the back to Everett. "We have no idea how many hours Ken spent on this project. Without Ken, it wouldn't have happened." Besides overseeing Forest Hall work, Everett earns his living as a forestry consultant to woodland owners while also managing Hopkins Forest operations and maintenance.

Everett's leadership also was recognized by Connie Battaile, a daughter of the late Margaret Hopkins, who donated the tree farm in 1990 to newly-formed Forests Forever. "It's fantastic," she said of Forest Hall in an interview. "Mother would be more than thrilled. She would not have been surprised by what Ken Everett could do."

Some of the visitors noticed the building lacks "made in

China" reminders. Most of the flooring, framing, supports and other wood is from Hopkins Forest or other Oregon timber stands and mills. Everett said he was glad when "made in the USA" labels showed on chairs he bought for the hall.

With no money now available, landscaping around the building will take a few years even with labor and plant material donations, Everett pointed out. Rain water will be collected from the building roof to irrigate native plants when they are in place.

Frank Wille of Oregon City, leader of Clackamas County Master Gardener volunteers, said the group will help with the landscaping. "As you go forward, we'll go with you," Wille said.

The Forest Hall's use will vary from educational sessions for Hopkins Forest, OSU Extension Service programs, community events and business meetings/retreats. Some types of family, church and other private events will be allowed. Everett said rental fees will pay for the building maintenance. FBI Launches New version of the Child ID App for Android Phones to Mark National Missing Children's Day

Friday, May 25th marked National Missing Children's Day in the United States. In honor of that observance, the FBI has released a new version of its popular Child ID App for Android mobile phones. The iPhone version of the app, launched in 2011, has already seen more than 121,000

downloads.

The FBI's Child ID app is a free and easy-to-use option for parents who want to have immediate access to their children's information should a child become lost.

The app allows parents to create profiles for each child in the family and to take or import pictures of each child. The pictures can be updated as frequently as the parents wish to do so. This is a particularly handy feature if a family is traveling or will be in crowded areas such as amusement parks, large sporting events, or concerts. In the event that the child disappears, parents will be able to show law enforcement officers exactly how the child looked and what he or she was wearing on that day.

The app also prompts parents to include information such as height, weight, hair color, eye color, and identifying scars or marks the child might have. All of this information is securely stored only on the parent's phone, but it is a resource that parents can access and provide to law enforcement within seconds if necessary.

The app also includes information on how to keep your children safe and step-by-step instructions about what to do in an emergency.

ORVET Home Loan Rate is Lowest Ever: 20 Years 2.875%

The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) has dropped its fixed rate home loan to the lowest rate ever -- 2.875 percent on a 20-year loan with a 3.206 APR and 1.375 percent origination fee.

The ORVET Home Loan Program is still offering one of the lowest home loan interest rates available to qualified veteran home buyers, including a reduced 30-year loan rate of 3.25 percent with a 1.375 percent origination fee (3.489 APR).

A 30-year loan rate with no origination fee is now 3.5

Barlow Road Closure to Begin July 10 for Road and Bridge Repairs

Clackamas County has moved back the closure of Barlow Road at Rock Creek (Long Bridge) from Tuesday, July 10. The road will remain closed through Monday, Oct. 1, 2012 for road and bridge repairs.

The 24-hour-a-day closure, which will extend from Highway 211 to Bond Road, is needed to repair the failing northbound lane and guardrail, replace two bridge timber pile caps and rehabilitate the stream bank.

Because one part of the project will require jacking up the bridge's superstructure, and another part will be rebuilding the failing northbound lane, the work zone will be completely closed to all traffic. Posted detour signs will direct traffic around the closure on nearby roads.

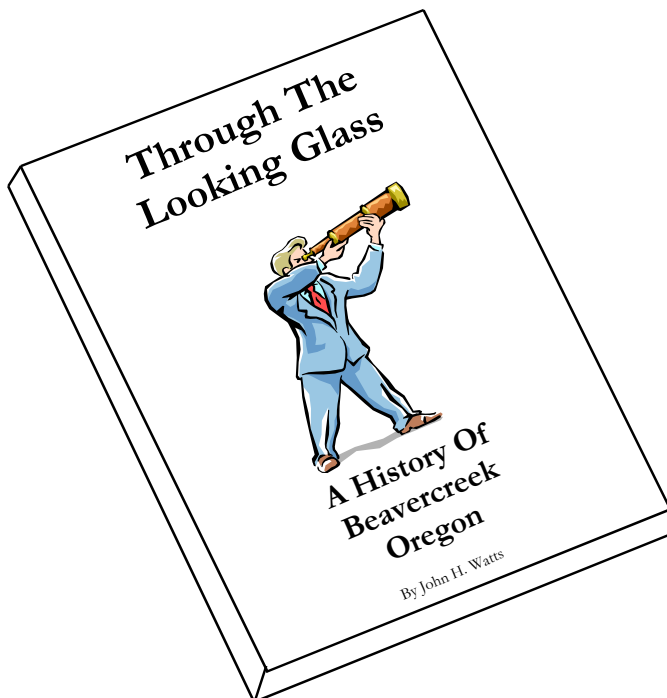

Clackamas Repertory Theatre's 2012 Season Opener 'The Odd Couple'

Clackamas Repertory Theatre opens its eighth season Friday, June 29, with Neil Simon's classic comedy, "The Odd Couple."

The CRT production features two Portland favorites Tim True and Michael O'Connell as Oscar Madison and Felix Ungar. CRT artistic director David Smith-English directs Simon's hysterical comedy about a slovenly, cigar-smoking sportswriter and a depressed, neurotic clean-freak, who try to live together after their wives have dumped them.

While Neil Simon is the world's most prolific and successful playwright, it was his older brother Danny, also a writer for TV comedy, who provided the inspiration for his brother's most enduring hit. After divorcing, Danny moved in with another divorced man and this situation became the set-up for "The Odd Couple." Though Danny had begun writing the story himself, he reached a block and eventually handed it off to his brother who soon made it a Broadway smash, starring Walter Matthau and Art Carney.

Ironically, when Paramount bought the rights to the original play, Simon's agent talked him into selling the entire rights to the play for \$10,000. Simon has not seen a penny of royalties or residuals from his most produced

Cameras in the Forest

Using cameras in the forest for monitoring wildlife populations and vandalism issues was the topic of a special twilight woodland tour on Thursday, June 28, 2012.

The program and tour was sponsored by the Clackamas County Farm Forestry Association and the OSU Extension Service. For more information contact OSU at 503-655-8631.

The program began with a hot dog roast at 6:00 p.m. and tour at 6:30 p.m. The location was east of Sandy –up Wildcat Mountain Drive.

Tour hosts Dan Green, Clackamas County Forester, and his assistant Sena Sanguinetti introduced the Clackamas County Forests Program. The focus for the evening was how cameras are used for managing the County's forestland. They described the types of cameras that are available, what they can and can't do, where to place cameras for best affect, how to monitor the results and how to keep them safe. Although the primary use of the cameras for the Clackamas County Forests is security, they aid in monitoring dumping, illegal recreation, and vandalism. The cameras are also for wildlife management.

John Gordon Watts passed away on May 19, 2012. He was 89 years old. John was born on September 17, 1922, in Portland, Oregon, to parents John and Gertrude Watts. He was raised in Beavercreek, Oregon, and after graduating from Oregon City High School, he served in the Navy in the South Pacific during WWII. John was a volunteer firefighter and former chief at the Beavercreek Fire station, and he was a former

Small Fire in Paper Mill Produces Large Amounts Of Smoke

At 8:02 p.m. Monday, June 18, 2012, Clackamas Fire's Truck 15 was dispatched to an automatic fire alarm sounding at the Blue Heron Paper Mill. While responding to the call, Blue Heron security workers on scene reported seeing smoke in the building.

Prior to arrival, Truck 15 called for the balance of a first alarm assignment to be dispatched. First arriving crews reported moderate smoke coming from the right side of "Paper Machine Building #1" located on the southwest corner of the complex. A small fire was located in the building, but was being contained to a confined area by the buildings

sprinkler system. The first arriving crews were able to quickly extinguish the small fire and search the building to ensure nobody was located inside. The building was then cleared of smoke and hazardous gases while firefighters performed the process of ensuring the fire was completely out and removing burned debris. The first alarm assignment consisted of Clackamas Fire Truck 15, Engine 16, Engine 9, Squad 17, Brush 13, Battalion 2 and 3 and Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue Engine 58.

The Blue Heron Paper Mill located at 419 Main St. Oregon City, is a vacant mill and is in the process of being dismantled by daytime contractors with a targeted completion date of August 2013. It was reported that work involving the use of welding equipment had been going on in this building for the previous two weeks and may have led to the smoldering fire in this building. The official cause of this fire is under investigation at this time. No injuries were reported and damage estimates are unknown at this time.

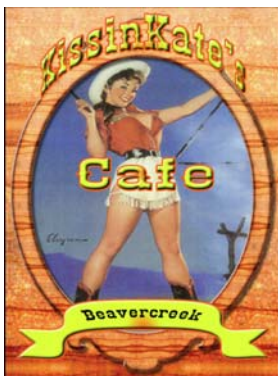

and Vulnerable Abuse Awareness Day. Governor John Kitzhaber has also proclaimed it as Oregon Elder and Vulnerable Adult Abuse Awareness Day. Communities around the world and throughout Oregon will be using this opportunity to raise awareness of elder abuse, neglect and exploitation. This year, Oregon is paying closer attention to raising understanding and awareness of financial exploitation.

In 2010, 41% of Oregon's founded abuse cases against elderly and vulnerable adults involved financial exploitation - that could be anything from a trusted family member or caregiver cashing someone's check with a forged signature to a shady financial advisor persuading someone to give away their life savings in an investment scam.

"It's the number one issue of abuse affecting our older popu-

abuse," he added. We can all help to prevent and reduce the abuse and mistreatment of our most vulnerable neighbors by becoming more involved and aware of what abuse looks like, taking thoughtful steps to prevent it, and reporting suspected abuse to law enforcement or Adult Protective Services (APS)."

In 2011, the Oregon legislature established the Elder Abuse Work Group to convene legislators, prosecutors, law enforcement, advocates, long term care providers, and abuse investigators to propose improvements to our elder abuse prevention and investigation

systems. The Oregon Legislature passed HB 4084 in February 2012, a bill that enhanced the tools available to investigators and prosecutors for combating financial exploitation and other abuses against Oregon's seniors.

Department of Human Services is working with its partners around the State to increase awareness of vulnerable and elder abuse and signs to look for. More information can be found on the state's elder abuse web page: <http://www.oregon.gov/DHS/spwpd/abuse/index.shtml>.

lation in Oregon and across the country," said Oregon Department of Human Services Director Erinn Kelley-Siel. "We must work together to better protect our elderly and vulnerable citizens from financial exploitation and abuse, an unthinkable crime that is becoming increasingly common," she said.

A 2010 study from MetLife found that most victims were women---they were twice as likely to fall victim of elder financial abuse then were men.

Although the abuser is usually someone the victim knows - an acquaintance, family member or professional caregiver -- occasionally a complete stranger may take advantage of a vulnerable adult as well, through various kinds of scams and swindles.

"Each year in Oregon over 600 Oregon seniors are known to be financially exploited --and the number is expected to grow dramatically if efforts aren't made to educate the public," said Fred Steele, Oregon Department of Human Services Community Adult Protective Services Manager.

June Vector Control Update

The mild, wet weather has not slowed the larvae population. The larvae population is higher this year due to our mild winter and relatively warm spring. The larvae population is being closely monitored with an emphasis on areas where vector species have been identified.

With the weather being wet and cool earlier this week our adult mosquito population has been low in most areas. Trapping was conducted this week. Mostly nuisance mosquitoes were found, as well as some vector mosquitoes. Trapping will continue on a regular basis.

West Nile Virus

FYI: There are four Risk Levels that have been identified. Clackamas County is currently at Risk Level 2 (see summary below as outlined in Clackamas County Vector Control District's Annual Work Plan 2011-2012).

Status: No west Nile virus activity detected in Clackamas County. Environmental conditions are suitable for mosquito development.

"The action taken in WNV Risk Level 2 is directed at the surveillance and control of immature mosquitoes (larval/pupal stages). The purpose of these actions is to reduce vector mosquito populations, particularly *Culex pipiens* and *Culex tarsalis* to a level where adult mosquito populations are too low to allow WNV transmission to wild birds."

Tip of the Week:

Mosquito prevention for children: Use care in applying repellent to children; don't put repellent on their hands, and be careful to avoid their mouths and eyes. Products containing 10% or less DEET are the most appropriate for children aged 2 to 12 years.

Oregon State Police (OSP) will activate the Wildland-Urban Interface Arson Patrol on July 1.

Retired state troopers Jim Davis, Klamath Falls, and Bill Lyons, Bend, will take on the twofold duties of fire prevention education and arson investigation. The beat is a familiar one to both men, as each worked the arson patrol in years past.

Arson likely accounts for only a small percentage of the total wildfires. But arsonists often become most active at the peak of the season, when firefighting resources are stretched thin. By deterring wild land arsons, Lyons and Davis can help free up firefighters and equipment to battle other blazes.

The patrol began in 1997 in response to significant forest resource losses caused by arsonists earlier that decade.

"Initially the main mission of the project was to patrol high-risk arson areas and respond to critical or emerging situations," Forestry's Jeff Bonebrake said. "It later expanded to provide increased investigative capacity, basically tapping the skills and training already possessed by these senior troopers."

During the 2012 wildfire season, the two officers will conduct patrols in their home areas. Klamath County and Deschutes County are considered "high fire" areas by ODF, due to the hot, dry weather, vegetation types and general remoteness. They will also be on call to travel elsewhere in the State to assist with arson investigations.

A federal State Fire Assistance grant funds the Arson Patrol, which will operate throughout the fire season.

The public is encouraged to report suspected arson activity by calling the Arson Patrol Hotline, 1-800-452-7888.

Parking Improvements in Downtown Oregon City

The City of Oregon City is committed to improving the accessibility of our 166 year-old downtown for pedestrians, and visitors who arrive by car. Community leaders also recognize the challenges in implementing the adopted downtown parking plan in the midst of several downtown construction projects that are revitalizing our downtown marketplace.

"Oregon City's historic downtown is an important part of our community identity," said David Frasher, City Manager. "The City is committed to improving the physical, cultural and commercial environment downtown."

The City is rolling out several new programs to help support a better business climate during the last phase of construction on Main Street. The following changes, programs and incentives will be implemented over the next several months.

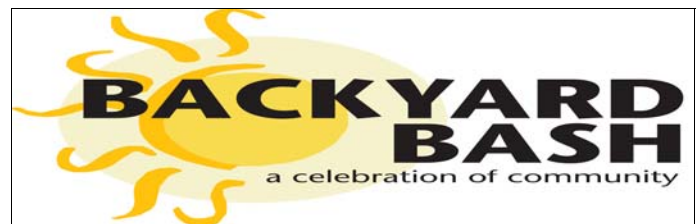
1. Installation of additional handicapped accessible stalls downtown. (August)
2. Installation of additional four-hour parking on 6th Street on the bluff. (July)
3. Parking Customer Coupon program. (July)
4. Parking permit discount program for parking customers using off street parking. (July)

The City is in the process of installing additional handicapped accessible stalls downtown. These stalls are parallel to the curb, which will provide better wheelchair access in the areas of Main Street that have had new sidewalks installed. This will increase the number of handicap accessible public parking stalls downtown to 11.

As noted in the downtown parking study, utilizing parking outside of the downtown core is vital to the overall success of retail activity downtown. The City will install additional four-hour parking stalls on 6th Street on the bluff, in order to accommodate long-term visitors who need more than 2 hours of parking.

The City's Parking Division has also created two new programs to support downtown businesses and parking customers. The first program is a Parking Customer Coupon program, which gives business owners control of their customer's downtown experience. This program, anticipated to roll-out in mid July, includes a coupon attached to the bottom of parking permits issues by the mid-block parking kiosks. These coupons can be used at participating businesses.

A second program for business owners and downtown employees, offers half price parking permits, for up to three months, for new permit holders in the Red and Purple Parking Zones. This program will help encourage day-long parking customers, often business owners and employees, to park off the street and in a parking lot.

Downtown Oregon City has seen a great deal of change over the last three years - a return to two-way traffic on Main Street, the addition of more than 40 new businesses, and a \$2.5 million streetscape improvement project scheduled for completion in August 2012. While these changes have had an impact on parking, there are more than 250 on street parking spots for downtown visitors and customers and more than 241 off street permit parking spots managed by the City of Oregon City.

CCC Awards Hundreds of Degrees in 2011-12

OREGON CITY — Graduation ceremonies at Clackamas Community College this week will honor hundreds of students earning degrees and certificates, as well as those completing their General Educational Development (GED) and Adult High School Diplomas.

This year at CCC, 488 students earned a GED, and 48 completed their Adult High School Diplomas. The youngest of those earning GEDs and high school diplomas is 16, and the oldest is 61. During the Thursday night graduation ceremonies, two students will be recognized for their achievements: Brittany Dorsey, earning the Adult High School Diploma, and Denise Steel, who is earning her GED.

During the 2011-12 academic year, 1,411 students earned degrees or certificates at CCC. The youngest of those graduates is 16, and the oldest is 69 years old. More than 480 students earned a cumulative grade point average (GPA) between 3.5 and 3.989, and 179 students earned a perfect 4.0.

The Clackamas County Master Gardener Association will be honored as the Distinguished Friends of the College. The Master Gardener Association created an endowment with the CCC Foundation in 1999. Since that time, the endowment has provided 40 full tuition scholarships to Clackamas horticulture students at the college.

Regence Changes Step In The Right Direction - Network Review To Be Part Of Upcoming Public Hearing

Regence BlueCross BlueShield of Oregon announced on June 12, 2012, that it will allow its Portland area individual health plan members to choose coverage from among five provider networks rather than just two as previously announced.

The Oregon Insurance Division had asked Regence for information about the impact of its prior plan to limit hospi-

tal and doctor choice to the two networks.

"We heard from people who were upset about being limited to the two networks and wanted to gather more information about consumers' access to care," Insurance Commissioner Lou Savage said. "We're pleased to see the company respond to these concerns and will continue to look closely at all these changes."

In expanding provider options, Regence said its premiums will vary by network, meaning at least some people will face a choice of whether they want to pay more to use a particular hospital or doctor.

This is a new twist on pricing health plans in Oregon's individual market, although some insurers offer small employers the option of lower premiums if they choose a particular network of hospitals and doctors. This approach could help shine a light on provider costs and create an incentive for providers within a network to work together to give people better care while better controlling costs, Savage said.

The proposed charges for different networks are to be part of a rate request that Regence expected to file with the division later in June. The division will hold a public hearing, tentatively in late July, on the request. The hearing is planned for the Portland area. People can also comment online. Hearing and public comment details will be posted at www.oregonhealthrates.org. The division must approve any rate change.

Regence is the largest insurer in Oregon's individual health insurance market for self-employed workers and others who don't get insurance through an employer. Although profitable overall, the company has lost money on its individual health plans since it reduced rates in mid-2006. This is among several changes Regence has announced this spring. None of these changes affect Medi-

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care or Regence's employer (group) plans.

Here is a summary of those changes:

Regence will stop offering some of its lower-deductible plans and move members to the plan that most closely resembles the one they had. (Most people will move to a \$2,500 deductible plan.) For most of Regence's individual health plan members, this change takes effect Dec. 1. This is allowed by law and does not need state approval.

Regence's Portland area members will no longer have access to the traditional Preferred Provider Network. However, they will be able to choose from five hospital-based Oregon Select networks: Adventist Health, Legacy Health, OHSU, Providence, or Tuality.

Once the division makes a decision on the anticipated Regence rate request and rates are finalized (by late August), Regence will send information to its members on plans and premiums that will be effective Dec. 1 for most people. People in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, and Yamhill counties will additionally be assigned to either the Adventist or Tuality network, depending on where they live. However, they can fill out a form to select one of the three other networks. Premiums for all five networks will be listed.

Clackamas River Water and Sunrise Water Authority to Consider Cooperative Agreement

The Clackamas River Water (CRW) and Sunrise Water Authority (Sunrise) Boards of Commissioners will meet separately in June to discuss a proposed plan for greater cooperation in drinking water supply, water delivery, and infrastructure planning.

The sharing of resources between the two agencies is not new. Sunrise currently purchases 2.5 million gallons of water per day from CRW and the two utilities have cost-saving agreements for sharing water quality testing, labor and equipment, engineering and planning, and geographic information services (GIS).

The proposed agreement further expands the ways the two agencies cooperate, benefiting ratepayers in both service areas. Under the proposed plan, CRW would sell up to 10 million gallons per day of unused water to Sunrise, maximizing the effective use of existing resources. The agreement would also look to extend boundary protections granted to Sunrise across the service territories of both agencies, giving CRW certainty in its future plans for serving its customers.

"This agreement gives our District a paying water customer for the foreseeable future, and allows us to more fully utilize infrastructure investments already made by our ratepayers," explains Lee Moore, CRW general man-

ager. Under the agreement, Sunrise will pay its allocated share of operating costs and future water system improvements.

In planning for the future, the clear choice for both parties is to make full use of existing infrastructure. "By partnering with our neighbor, Sunrise secures a long-term supply of top quality drinking water--without impacts to the Clackamas River or the need to build new facilities," says Wade Hathhorn, general manager of Sunrise Water Authority. "We get a supply of safe drinking water that will support the health and economy of our two communities and make effective use of existing facilities," Hathhorn concludes.

The agreement does not change ownership of any assets. CRW and Sunrise will retain ownership of their own water rights and facilities. The agreement will be governed by an equal number of representatives from each of the elected Boards of Commissioners, while both Boards remain in charge of their separate utilities. "This is not a merger," Moore emphasizes. "Rather it's a means for allowing the two agencies to meet their future needs in a cooperative, cost-effective way."

The Clackamas River Water Board of Commissioners met to discuss the agreement on Thursday, June 21, 7:00 p.m. at CRW's Administrative Offices. Sunrise Water Authority Board met on the same topic on June 27, 6:00 pm at Sunrise's Administrative Offices. 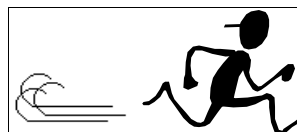
