Grand Theft Auto

Would you believe that there have been two auto thefts from the Beavercreek area in a three day span?

The first vehicle was a green 2002 Suzuki ATV, owned by Tom Rodgers, whose residence is on Powder Road in Beavercreek. Mr Rodgers was awakened at about 2:20 a.m. on the morning of May 4, 2003, by the sound of what he thought was his ATV being started. The vehicle was parked in an open area next to the Rodgers' residence. Mr Rodgers got up and went outside to look and saw an unknown individual driving his vehicle down the road.

The second vehicle, a 1967 blue Camaro, was stolen on May 7, 2003, from the Micheal Yoder residence on Beavercreek Road (near Williams Road and Whitney Lane). The vehicle had been stolen sometime during the night. This Camaro had undergone years of restoration and was Mr. Yoders' pride and joy.

The car was later found up on Hillock Burn Road near Estacada. The car was stripped down. Nothing remained but the shell.

There have been quite a few burglaries recently in the area. The thieves have been quite brazen in their pursuit. In one case a garage was broken into on Henrici Road during the evening hours while the homeowner was away. The thieves disassembled the homeowners' 1969 Camaro using the homeowners' own tools.

There have been other instances of garages being broken into and car parts stolen.

Apparently, we have a ring, or possibly more than one, operating in our vicinity. These individuals seem to know who to target. If you have a classic car or cars, or are restoring an older vehicle for fun or profit, it might be a good idea to talk to a security service about protecting your home and outbuildings. It might save you a lot of grief and money in the long run.

If you see anything suspicious in your neighborhood call the Sheriff's department and report it. Don't assume everything is alright and the homeowner knows what is going on. If you make an innocent mistake and the authorities show up and everything is alright I'm sure your neighbor will be grateful. It is when we make assumptions, or don't want to get involved because of our busy schedules, that these things happen and innocent people are hurt. Kindergarten entrance requirements are:


- Registration / Student Information Card

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part X of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

- - - AGRICULTURE AND INDUSTRY (CONT.) - - -

In 1958 the Northwest Berry Association was organized and Mr. Herbert Steiner became president of the Association. This group contracted their crops to the most lucrative bidding processors. There was a great need for pickers, and indeed there were hundreds of them around - families coming from as far away as Missouri and other states. These migrant families followed the crops and came year after year. One family from Missouri was very large with the children's ages rangeing from a baby-in-arms to teenagers, and it seemed that each year there was a new baby. They were in the fields early and made good wages,



especially in those years when the market prices were the highest.

The growers had many problems with pickers, especially with children who failed to pick their rows clean; and as the old saying goes, "kids will be kids." They would play and toss berries around at one another and their clothes and faces bore the indelible dye of the berries.

There were field bosses who rode herd on these miscreants and who tried to keep some semblance of order and industry going, but the field boss had to move on eventually and the pickers resorted to their old antics very often. The migrant families went to the local stores every day at lunch time to buy their lunch; each one seemed to be on his or her own buying wieners, pop, potato chips, mostly junk foods.

When the pickers weighed in their berries they were issued tickets that indicated how many pounds of berries had been picked. These tickets were surrendered when pickers were given their final pay. There was one couple who picked for McKays over the years who had to have their pay at the end of every day's picking. They always stopped at a local store to cash their checks before going home (Banks charged them to cash their checks).

As the years passed, it became increasingly difficult to obtain dependable pickers to harvest the crop, especially when more steady employment became available. Those that did pick were more independent and toward the end of the season when picking was not as good, there was always a noticeable drop-off among pickers in spite of the fact most growers



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offered a bonus to anyone who stayed to the end of the season. When one year a real problem developed in lining up enough pickers, the growers learned that it was possible to get pickers from Portland's skid row. The McKays made arrangements to hire this crew and were told when they arrived that wine was to be available right away and informed them on how much to get. Since this was a surprise to the McKays, it was necessary for Mrs. McKay to drive to Oregon City and way points to buy the wine. And she, not being altogether familiar with this sort of shopping found that there was a limit to the number of bottles one establishment could sell to one person, which necessitated patronizing several such places to obtain the quantity required. Upon her return the wine was turned over to the man who had informed her of its immediate need. This caused her to be severely reproved by the supervisor of the group, who told her it was only to be distributed among the men after the day's work was done, and not before! The man responsible for the problem had known better and stood beside her while she was reprimanded but spoke nary a word in her defense knowing he would be in trouble with his boss. She, taking the rap without implicating him, later had the opportunity to let him know in no uncertain terms that she did not appreciate the problem he had caused.

When pickers were no longer a dependable source, a

machine was finally developed for blackcap picking. This is a very large machine that straddles the row shaking the berries onto a conveyor belt that is presided over by a small crew that removes leaves and, debris as the berries are crated.

Livestock has proved to be an important line for some, while others have raised turkeys and broilers commercially, as well as poultry farms strictly for egg production, while the farm flocks have all but disappeared.

In addition to the Harris Sawmill, there were many sawmills in the area. Larkin's Mill operated in several locations in the Highland District, along with Schreiber's and Roy Hehn's Mills. And, at a later date, the Clackamas Fir Lumber Company was one of the larger mills that shipped much of its lumber by rail over the old Carver Railroad. In the Clarkes area the A.W. Bell Sawmill was also one of the larger mills, and the Marshalls and Forristalls operated mills there. There was also the Moehnke and Bluhm Mill near the old Lower Highland Road, which is now the South Carus Road, located east of the South Beavercreek Road. And, there was the old, old. Cutting Sawmill that was located west of the Beavercreek stores. Carl and Walter Steiner operated a shingle mill under the name Steiner Brothers, located on the home place.

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Students Distribute Almost \$9,000 in Grants to Local Nonprofit Organizations

Community 101 students at Carus Elementary School recently shared some good news with Clackamas County area community groups. As participants in the PGE Foundation's innovative philanthropy program, students in Carol Dubuy's fourth- and fifth-grade class presented \$8,669 in charitable grants to seven nonprofit organizations at a reception held at the school Tuesday, April 29. Dubuy's students also made a \$1,000 contribution to fund programs at Carus. The PGE Foundation, PGE employees and Carus student fund-raisers provided Community 101 funding.

Community 101 is a yearlong youth involvement program designed to help teach students the importance of community service and empower them to directly impact Oregon communities through the grantmaking process.

Carus is the only elementary school among the 25 programs enrolled in this year's Community 101. Through their hard work, approximately 800 students are distributing almost \$200,000.00 to nonprofit agencies throughout the state of Oregon.

income seniors.

- 2. \$1,000 granted to Catholic Charities to fund an adult native-language literacy program for low-income Hispanic families.
- 3. \$1,125 granted to Court Appointed Special Advocates to fund coordinator training programs.
- 4. \$1,125 granted to Outside In to provide incentives for homeless youth.
- 5. \$1,468 granted to Clackamas Women's Services to fund a program that supports children in domestic violence situations.
- 6. \$1,827 granted to Clackamas Service Center to fund emergency food assistance programs. This grant was funded from PGE employee contributions.
- 7. \$624 (raised by Carus students) granted to Kirstin's Kloset at Legacy Emanuel Children's Hospital. Funds will be used to purchase pajamas for children undergoing cancer treatment. Kirstin's Kloset was created as a tribute to Dubuy's 4-year-old granddaughter who currently is in remission from cancer.
- 8. \$1,000 to be used for programs within Carus Elementary School.

In addition, students also raised \$100 to seed a Community 101 endowment fund, to be named in honor of Dubuy, for the new Carus Community 101 Club.

Supervised by teacher/advisors, students use

Community 101 materials to guide them through the grantmaking process. In creating their own charitable foundations, students write mission statements, set goals and research community needs, and the PGE Foundation encourages participants to fundraise a portion of the money they distribute. Students also volunteer at local organizations and conduct site visits with a variety of community groups. Using the information gathered from these experiences, students solicit and evaluate grant requests from nonprofit organizations. Then during the spring, students announce grant recipients.

Community 101 adds value to the educational system by developing civic responsibility among students, planting the seeds for lifelong community involvement. The program teaches skills needed for leadership and in future careers. In addition, Community 101 strengthens communities, both through the grants allocated by students and the new partnerships formed between schools, nonprofit groups and businesses.

Created in 1997, Community 101 is the signature program of the corporate foundation of Portland General Electric. The mission of Community 101 is to help young people discover more about their communities -- and enable them to bring about positive changes -- through grantmaking. In 2002, Community 101 received the Youth in Philanthropy Award from the Association of Fundraising Professionals.





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

- Review the status of the above permits
- Check on inspection results (for contractors only)
- Request inspections or take out permits

This service is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It use can save time for the general public, since they won't have to come to the office to obtain information, or wait on the phone for someone to do data research. The database goes back to March 6, 1996.


