Thank you advertisers!

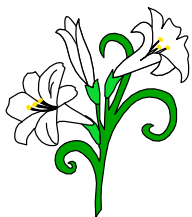

Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History

In last months issue I presented Part V of the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History. Here then is part VI. (The original transcript done by O.F. Dickson) The Editor

One of the many ways that the BCT supports its community is through a scholarship program which was established in 1990. So far, \$115,000 has been awarded to local students.

Since the 1990's, the BCT began offering quite a few new services. BCT became an ISP (Internet Service Provider) in December of 1998. There are currently over 1,200 customers who subscribe to BCT Online.

BCT began offering cable television in 1996, after The Telecommunications Act allowed them to compete in that arena. June of 2001 saw the BCT surpassing cable television competition by adding digital cable television. The larger selection in channels and improved technology proved to be popular with the membership. To date, there are over 2,600 cable television customers.

A companion product, which BCT began offering in August of the same year, is the home theater. Working with another local company, 800.com, BCT could offer the "theater experience" to its members, without having to keep inventory in stock.

In July of 2001, the BCT expanded into the long-distance market. Members are now able to utilize a local company for their domestic long-distance needs.

BCT's increasing membership required increases in the staff, so they purchased a building from the local water company on Henrici Road in June of 1998. The business office and administrative office are now housed there.

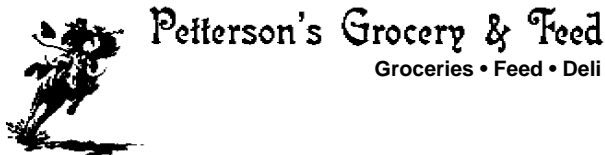
Both discussed their platforms and answered questions from the audience on their stance on certain issues.

Clackamas County to Place Community Safety Levy on May 21 Ballot

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners has agreed to place a community safety levy on the May 21 ballot. The three-year levy is expected to yield about \$13.1 million the first year, \$13.9 the second and \$14.6 the third year for an estimated total of \$41.6 million over the life of the levy. The proceeds will be used by the County Sheriff, District Attorney, Juvenile Department and Community Corrections to maintain current levels of service.

The money would also add 115 beds at the county jail.

The levy would be paid for by property owners at a rate of 59 cents per \$1,000 in assessed value. That amounts to about \$88 a year for a \$150,000 home.

The levy request is a result of monetary shortfalls in the operation of the County's community safety programs and from an identified need for more beds at the jail. The Board of County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on the levy March 14 at the Board of County Commissioners Hearing Room, 906 Main St. in Oregon City. The hearing will begin at 10 a.m. For more information call Finance Director Marc Gonzales at 503-353-4345 or Commissioner Larry Sowa at 503-655-8581.

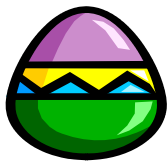

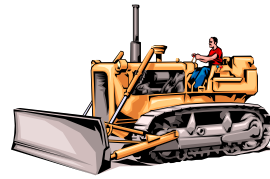
