Oregon City Commission Votes to Include Land South of Henrici

A meeting was held at the Oregon City Hall in Oregon City by the City Commission October 2, 2002. At this meeting, after discussion, the Oregon City Commission voted to recommend to Metro to include land south of the Oregon City Golf Club (south of Henrici Rd, towards Beaver Creek) in its request to Metro for expansion of the Urban Growth Boundary. The amount of land brought into the boundary will be decided in December by the Metro Council.

Commissioners Doug Neeley and Derrick Beneville had attended the September meeting of the Beaver Creek CPO to discuss the land being proposed for inclusion. The members were told that Oregon City was really only interested in land on the East side of Beaver Creek Rd across from the college and southward and that it was not very interested in the land south of the golf course up to Henrici Rd or any land south of there... even though the study done by the planning commission stated that they wanted the land considered.

At the October 2nd Commissioners meeting Commissioners Gary Hewitt and Dan Holladay solidly supported adding the additional area. Mayor John Williams seemed to be undecided and Mr Neeley and Mr Beneville were not for taking more land.

Mayor Williams was swayed that the commission should vote for the larger area in order to gain control of the area for future expansion.

The Redland/Holcomb area was also discussed and

the developer who had bought a lot of land in the area on speculation, who had plans for its development, basically got everything he requested.

An area known as Southend was also under consideration. Oregon City asked for a smaller addition than Metro had suggested.

A concern for Beaver Creek is that Oregon City is

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going to want to grab more land every 5 years. The question arises... are they taking this unneeded land before they lose the opportunity?

There is a need in the Urban Growth Boundary for land designated for Industrial use. A lot of the land south of the golf course is not in big enough pieces for this purpose. Oregon City supposedly needs Industrial not residential land so why the land grab unless it is to thwart the efforts of Beavercreek having its own autonomy and identity.

This is a wake-up call to the residents of Beavercreek! We need to step up to the plate and get involved and try to gain control of our area before Oregon City takes it away from us. How will we do that? I'm not sure, but all avenues of self determination must be explored so that in 5 years we will have our acts together and Oregon City will not be able to take any more of our rural culture away. Beavercreek CPO Spotlight

The October meeting of the Beavercreek CPO took place on Wednesday, October 23, 2002, at the Beavercreek Grange. The meeting was at 7:00 p.m.

The guest speaker was Ken Spiegle, Manager of Clackamas County Community Environment. One of the many services Mr Spiegel's department is in charge of is the County's building code enforcement.

Mr Spiegle explained the services that his department provides and how those have changed in the past few years due to budget cuts at the County.

The members discussed with Mr Spiegle areas of concern regarding code violations of which they were aware and the remedies for these violations.

The department is compliance (not enforcement) related at this time, but the possibility of new fees and higher fees for violations was discussed. This would facilitate more inspectors that would allow more compliance with the building codes.

Mr Spiegle explained the steps gone through by his

department from the initial contact by a citizen filing a complaint, to the County taking certain individuals to court, if necessary, to get compliance.

The information given by Mr Spiegle was very informative. The members felt that the County should be as vigilant as possible in addressing these issues. Mr Spiegle encouraged the members to contact him personally with their concerns and he would follow up on them.

The October 22, 2002, Metro meeting that occurred the night before at CCC was also discussed. The members present who had attended this meeting believed that the Councilors from Metro were not very attentive and felt there was a definite bias shown towards developers who got up to speak over the citizens of the areas being impacted. The developers were given much more time for their presentations, while the citizenry were continually cut off before they were done. Many felt that it was already decided what

was going to happen and that the citizen input was only a formality. The next meeting of the CPO will be on Wednesday, November 27, 2002 at the same place and time. For more information, please call 503-632-8370 and leave a message.

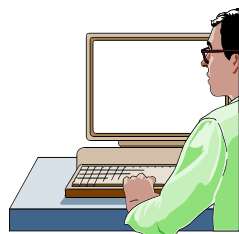

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part V of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his remembrances. The Editor.

---ROADS AND TRANSPORTATION ---

Road building in the early days was a hard and slow process; and there was a need for a large army of men with picks, shovels, wheelbarrows and a lot of "elbow grease" to get the job done. This method eventually gave way to a large crew of men as well as horses and mules with which they used "fresnos, slips and scrapers." To observe the roadbuilding scene in those

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times one would wonder "if everybody knew what they were doing." One sidewalk superintendent (even though there was no sidewalk) observed that one team would scoop up a load of dirt and haul it away while another team would dump his load in exactly the same spot where the other had scooped dirt out. Those were the days when each district had a road supervisor.

Many road meetings were held to discuss ways and means to improve the roads, with the main road having priority. Some districts would vote special levies to improve their district while the district beyond them would not support any levies for their district, although it was believed their roads needed it more than some that supported levies. This resulted in some clashes between districts because the districts farther out used their improved roads when travelling to Oregon City and there was deep resentment.



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The County had several rock crushers that could be set up and then dismantled to be moved to another location. Usually a site was chosen where ample rock was available to warrant moving the equipment in. Before the crusher was set up the road supervisor would hire a crew to dig rocks as well as to hire rock breakers to break the rock into a size that could be handled by the men and the size the crusher could accommodate. Rock-breaking is a science and not everybody could do it. Two men could work side by side breaking rock all day. One might be an easy going man who studied the rock and turned it to his liking and strike the rock with a sharp blow with good results. The other, a good worker might succeed in producing as good results as the first man or he may not. But at the end of the day the second man might be tired to the bone while his partner would be much more comfortable.

In hauling the rock to the crusher the conventional wagon bed was removed from the running gear and the special rock bed put in its place. This bed consisted of about fourteen pieces of rough lumber, two of which were sideboards about 15-inches wide, two end gates, and about eight pieces of 4" x 4" for the floor. These floor boards were notched in front and back to match and fit the standards to keep them stable; the floor boards extended well beyond both the head board and the tailgate. The ends of these floor

boards were trimmed and rounded on the portion that extended past the head board and tailgate. There was a good reason for this. When the wagon was used to haul crushed rock to the road, these rounded ends of the floor boards provided room between the individual floor boards so that the fingers of each of the two men could grasp the floor boards, removing them one at a time, after first removing the head and tailgates. This allowed the rock to fall through the running gear of the wagon to the road. Usually the helper was the man whose job it was to rake and spread the rock on the road and move the wagon several times while unloading it. This special wagon was used for hauling the rock to the crusher, as well as rock from the crusher to the road.

The road to Oregon City was built with crushed rock and it was full of the proverbial chuck-holes, which left a lot to be desired as far as roads and maintenance were concerned. Actually, there were two roads; the rock road for winter use and a dirt road paralleling it that was used mostly in the summer months and was popular with lumber haulers and teamsters because it was easier on the horses' hooves, especially if they were not shod. In places the dirt road was much lower than its rock counterpart, and the dust was deep because the road was badly eroded by the constant travel.

Heavy wagons were used for hauling and most farmers had several racks that were adapted for different type loads such as the hay rack, the wagon box



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for sacked grain or whatever, and for hauling lumber, which required only the running gear. And most farmers had one or more lighter conveyances such as a buggy, a hack, a surrey, and a light wagon. There was also a lighter and faster horse or team to pull these vehicles.

rustic house out back was the norm, but a little attention still needs to be paid to the basics of waste management.

Septic tanks need to be inspected periodically and receive proper maintenance if they are to work properly. They must be operated properly and not overtaxed or the owner may find him or herself with repair or replacement costs.

You should have your septic inspected every 1-2 years and your tank pumped when necessary.

Remember that commercial additives added to the septic are no substitute for inspections and pumping to keep a system healthy. These additives could also be harmful.

If you use a garbage disposal on a septic system you will have to pump the tank more frequently to remove all the solids that will fill the bottom of your tank.

Remember when on a septic you are not on a sewer and the amount of waste water sent to the system is important. Each load of wash with a standard top load washing machine puts 53 gallons of water in your system. A couple of loads of wash a day can tax your system if it is full of solids.

To protect you drainfield, you should never drive or park on it as it can compact the soil which will limit its ability to absorb the affluent properly. You should also not allow other water from your home to be dumped on the drainfield.

**Urban Growth Boundary Public Meeting
Held October 22nd at
Clackamas Community College**

The Metro Urban Growth Boundary meeting was held at Clackamas Community College on Tuesday, October 22, 2002. The standing-room-only crowd of more than 200 citizens let Metro know in no uncertain terms that they like living in a rural setting and do not want that lifestyle changed by the Metro Council in December. Mike Burton of Metro proposed that Oregon City receive about 1400 acres for development. The recommendation called for about 615 acres along South Beavercreek Road and South Henrici Roads, approximately 700 acres in the South End area and 84 acres in the Redland/Holcomb area. Included in the 615 acres for Oregon City is land

across from Clackamas Community College running South along Beavercreek Road and land further south to Henrici Road. The audience was very vocal about the proposed addition of land along Henrici Road south of Oregon City, as they believe it will destroy the quality of their lives. The citizens were stunned when an Oregon City Commissioner, Gary Hewitt, announced that Oregon City also wanted 255 acres south of Henrici Road. Mr Hewitt also stated that he had spoke with the Beavercreek CPO and that they were attempting to work out an agreement as to how the area should be developed. Norm Andreen, Co-Chair, of the Beavercreek CPO, stated that neither he nor Chuck Lyons, the other Co-Chair have had any conversations with anyone from Oregon City regarding how the 255 acres south of Henrici would be developed. In fact, Mr Andreen was cut short in his comments by Rod Park, Metro Councilor chairperson.

**Green Corridor Meeting Held
October 30th in Canby**

A meeting of the Green Corridor Project Advisory Committee took place on October 30th at the Hope Village Senior Living Facility, 1535 S. Ivy Street, Canby, OR, from 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting was to introduce the project to the citizenry and provide an opportunity for general citizen review. There are to be four meetings in the series. The Advisory Committee includes representatives from Molalla, Canby, Oregon City and the County as well as CPO representatives from New Era/Central Point, Mulino, Carus, Molalla, Beavercreek and general citizens and experts. The purpose of the meetings, a study of state Hwy 99E and Hwy 213, is to develop a County plan and the ordinances needed to protect the visual integrity of these areas as rural and natural resource areas. To maintain a seperation between the Portland urban area and the UGBs of Canby and Molalla along the major transportation routes, and reduce intrusion of conflicts when new development occurs. The information on this meeting was not received in time to get in the October issue, but hopefully we will get information on future meetings in a timely manner to let those who wish to attend do so.
