# Beavercreek Community Planning Organization (BCPO) Writes Letter to Officials Regarding Over Development and Public Safety

Last month we shared with you the business transacted at the Beavercreek CPO. This is the letter that was sent to the Clackamas County Commission and Alice Norris, Mayor of Oregon City, voicing the CPOs concerns. The Editor

RE: Concurrency in Beavercreek

Dear Board of County Commissioners:

At our September 2003 meeting, the Beavercreek CPO voted unanimously to send a letter to the Clackamas County Board of County Commissioners with a copy to the Oregon City Mayor to let you know the CPO's concerns about the inadequacy of traffic infrastructure to handle traffic created by new and feeding planned development in the corridor Beavercreek Road and Highway 213 -- that is the inadequacy of traffic infrastructure to handle development originating and planned to originate in both Oregon City and the County. As a result, we in Beavercreek are seeing increasing traffic backups, dangerous situations, and impacts neighborhoods.

We are aware of the present improvements being done to the intersection of Highway 213 and Beavercreek Road; however, this improvement does not address the inadequacy of the rest of the area's road system. Some examples of other impacts and expected impacts of new and planned development on area traffic are:

- (1) The level of service on area roads continues to decrease
- (2) The Oregon City High School is now occupied by about two thousand new students and staff without any

increase in the capacity of Beavercreek Road.

(3) A new housing development on Glen Oak Road was built without increases in capacity of Beavercreek Road or Highway 213.

- (4) A new housing development on Highway 213 by Centrex homes is not being serviced by new Highway 213 capacity.
- (5) The expansion of facilities at Clackamas Community College, adjacent to both the new high school, and the planned Light Industrial area has not been accompanied by road capacity increases.
- (6) Large urban-congregation churches have been repeatedly approved in Beavercreek, including two on Henrici Road, despite intersection failures at Highway 213 projected in the near future, without requirements that the churches make road improvements beyond the facilities' own entrances.
- (7) A large apartment complex is presently being built on Highway 213 near Meyers Road, but again, no.road capacity improvements are expected.
- (8) The planned light industrial area across from Clackamas Community College, when developed, will require increased capacity of Beavercreek Road and Highway 213 to avoid further impacts on this already

- (9) Increased traffic counts on Henrici Road, unrelated to local traffic, reflect traffic avoiding Redland Rd.
- (10) Beavercreek Rd. is being used by motorists to avoid Highway 213 despite its inappropriate design including two 90-degree turns, blind hills, and lack of shoulders. This has resulted in numerous accidents and injuries of pedestrians in the last few years.
- (11) Non-arterials in Beavercreek, some with blind hills, driveways, neighborhood joggers, pedestrians and kids, equestrians, and bicyclists, are being used for through traffic as motorists avoid Beavercreek Rd.
- (12) The current inability of local government to collect state highway system development charges, to keep Highway 213's capacity in balance with traffic, limits funding for highway improvements, but this handicap has not resulted in planning staff taking serious reductions in levels of service and in public safety into account when approving new development.

Overall, we are noticing that the lack of concurrency and the lack of consistent use of system development charges to maintain satisfactory service and safety levels on transportation infrastructure. This is degrading both the traffic flow on the highways and arterials and spreading high-speed and high-impact traffic though our community causing congestion and danger.

These traffic and safety failures lead us to request that more development be denied for this general area until adequate traffic infrastructure and safety are present. Could you please help us with this matter and discuss solutions with us?

# "Beavercreek Oregon a History

## Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part XV in a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

-- THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY (CONT.) --

The writer returned from military service in January of

1919 and could hardly believe what had happened. Hoff Brothers were in the hands of receivers; they were bankrupt!

Mr. George Havill had built a new building replacing the old blacksmith shop and in combination with his blacksmith trade he began to provide the first local automobile repair service.

When the store closed, Mr. Havill vacated the office in his new building and used it to stock staple grocery items for the convenience of customers of the store. The Havills had known of the likelihood of the bankruptcy and had opened this miniature store for the purpose of getting a foot in the door, so to speak, because the Havills had intended to bid on the bankrupt stock. In due time their bid was accepted and they were in the grocery business. They operated in the same store and location until the Jones's lease expired. Finally an extension of the lease was obtained for one year.

In the interim the Havills purchased the buildings from Jones. The buildings were the store, the warehouse attached to it, a small two-room apartment also attached to the east side of the store, the separate warehouse, and garage. There was also a woodshed, which had been the former mail carrier's quarters where Route 4's mail had been sorted. These buildings are mentioned because it was the intention of the Havills to move all of them to their own property across the road from where the buildings stood.

Mr. Henry Steiner was engaged to supervise the moving job. A great deal of preparation was necessary before the move could take place. Many buildings on the Havill property had to be rearranged to make room for the buildings across the road. An old barn had to be razed to make room for the garage that stood where the store was to be located. The garage had faced north toward the road and the full length of the building. It was now to be turned and moved so that the narrow end faced the road, and north. The warehouse and truck garage were moved directly across the road and very close to the Telephone Office

(which was later used for a real estate office). The building had to be turned completely around so that the garage was accessible from the road. The woodshed was moved behind where the store was to be set, serving the same purpose for many more years.

The cottage, separated from the store, was moved before the store and the warehouse. The cottage remained in the road overnight with the end that had been attached to the store wide open and our few belongings exposed to view. It was placed back of where the store was to be positioned. Later two rooms were added and a white picket fence placed in front and facing what is now Kamrath Road. Next the warehouse, which had to be turned half-way around so that it would again face the road and north. After this, the store, itself, was moved and turned in the same manner and again was attached to the warehouse as before, except that it



was placed a little lower than the warehouse, which was spotted at the proper height for loading and unloading the trucks with a hand truck. The store in its lowered position also made it more convenient for foot customers to come and go. The result of this was a couple of steps between store and warehouse. The steps later gave way for a ramp. It may be of interest to note that business was not interrupted during the moving process. This was accomplished by nailing a couple of 2" x 12" planks in the door's entrance, which were drug along with the building.

There was also a cobbler's shop operated by a Mr. Williams, a genial, straggly bearded gentleman. This shop was fitted into space between the store and the garage. Originally this shop was located on what is now

the site of the Kaufman's store.


#### Dorman W. Moehnke

## Failure To Stop at Stop Sign Causes Accident

At about 6:24 p.m. on the evening of September 30, 2003, there was a two vehicle accident at the intersection of S. Kamrath and S. Carus Rds.


The accident involved a green 1999 Chevrolet Cavalier, driven by John Basquez Jr., age 28, of Beavercreek, and a green 1998 Ford Windstar Van driven by Robbie Hubbard, age 57, of Beavercreek.

When an off-duty officer arrived, about a minute after the incident, witnesses had stopped and were assisting the occupants of both vehicles.

Investigation showed that Mr. Basquez had failed to stop for the Stop sign as he was travelling West on Carus Rd., and that he hit the van, driven by Mr. Hubbard, who was travelling North on Kamrath Rd. Mr Hubbard had the right of way as there is no stop sign for North or South bound traffic. He hit the van in the side causing the van to roll several times before coming to rest, right side up about 100 feet to the North of the impact. The impact also caused Mr. Basquez's vehicle to spin around and finally come to rest near the middle of the intersection facing in a mostly eastward direction.

Mr Basquez's son was in the vehicle at the time of the accident. Luckily, neither he nor the two drivers were serioulsy injured. My Basquez was cited for failure to stop at a stop sign.






