“Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass”

This is Part IV of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts! We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his remembrances! The Editor.

--- THE BEAVER CREEK SCHOOL (CONT) ---

In the mid 1920's the Beaver Creek School had a baseball team that rated among the best. In those days there was competition among the schools of the county, and Beaver Creek won its way into the playoffs at the Chautauqua Grounds in Gladstone and was pitted against one of the teams favored to win in the finals. Beaver Creek, not having heard about this, defeated the favored and faced Molalla in the final game. Mr. George Havill, the local storekeeper, was very much interested in children and baseball. Not liking the idea of these boys playing in their overalls at the Chautauqua Grounds, he persuaded

the Gladstone aggregation to lend the Beaver Creek team their suits. The team cut a rather striking, and amusing sight in their much too large suits--little Jake Heft, the smallest of the lot and shortstop of the team, had a very busy afternoon between making his put-outs and keeping his pants up. Jake's brother Earl, who was older than Jake, was pitcher. He was outstanding and gave an excellent account of

himself; and all Beaver Creek was very proud of him and the team, even though they were defeated by

Molalla.

While these same boys attended school, a former Director tells the story of when 34 teachers applied for the teachers position all applications were read very carefully and then the



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references. In the process of elimination they settled on the most promising candidate, a man from Kansas. When the teacher arrived, he was much older than anticipated and the kids had a field day every day it seems. From today's vantage point some of the antics and incidents seem very funny indeed, but in truth it was tragic for the Board of Directors because the school was virtually disrupted continually.

An occasion of interest was when the teacher, Miss Erana Bluhm, promoted and directed a four-act play among adults in the district. The play was followed by a basket social that was held at Beacon Heights Hall, located above the Ten O'Clock Church on the bend of the road where South Spangler Road turns west. Schubel School had previously staged a play and basket social a few weeks before the Beaver Creek production and netted about \$150, a very good showing for the times. Some Schubel folks let it be

hours--someone was stealing wood from the school's woodshed. Albert Weidner (another director) and I arranged to have a neighbor nearest the school alert us if anyone drove past their home; the road at the time was a dead end. We felt that the prospects for apprehending the wood thieves were good. One night the word came, and Albert armed with his .22 rifle, and I with a flashlight hiked to the school. Albert went

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known that Beaver Creek couldn't do as well. The outcome of this was that the Beaver Creek cast all pledged that they would not allow any basket to be sold for under five dollars and the highest priced basket sold that night was for \$32. The proceeds came to something over \$220, and the money was used to build the old play shed at the old school grounds.

During the time the writer served on the Board of Directors, we experienced some trouble after school

around the school one way and I the other; we were very sure of ourselves, finding the car between the school and the woodshed. We met at the car, one on each side, and found the most frightened couple you could ever hope to see! But shucks, it was all for nothing. They weren't interested in stealing wood or anything like it. The wood-stealing culprits were never caught!

Through the changing times over the years the following districts were carved out of "Old District 15": Carus, Henrici, Schubel, Clarkes, Highland, Hazel Dell, Falls View, Mulino, Eldorado, Clairmont, and Maple Lane. Today, the spelling of Schubel School is "Schuebel;" it is unknown to the author as to just why or when the spelling was changed from the original name. (it has also been spelled, "Shubel.")

In the spring of 1946 an ambitious plan of consolidation was suggested that included some of the same districts mentioned above; namely, Hazel Dell, Eldorado, Schubel, Clarkes, Highland, Lower Highland, and Henrici. The districts voting in favor of consolidation were Beaver Creek, Henrici, Falls View, Hazel Dell, and



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Shuebel. However, Schubel held a second election and decided against the consolidation at that time.

The first Board of Directors of the new consolidated school were Mr. Edward Roberts from Henrici, Walter Steiner from Beaver Creek, and Mr. William Sawyer of Hazel Dell. During the construction period of the new school building the Board faced many trying difficulties. It called for the passage of a bond issue of \$57,000. The construction costs came to \$62,500, and the grounds were still to be graded and a deep well drilled.

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During this time the Board operated three of the old schools-- Beaver Creek, Falls View, and Henrici -- and utilized the Grange Hall for a short time. It was, however, one and one-half years before all pupils could be brought together in the new school. The first use of the new consolidated school came after the Christmas holidays of 1947. School actually started in January, 1948. The Beaver Creek School finally affiliated itself with the Oregon City School System in a second attempt election; the first being defeated by just a few votes. On the second try it won by only five or six votes. This was accomplished in the fall of 1954. The Board of Directors during this period were: Mr. Cecil O. McKay, Sr., Mr. Ray Wilson, and Mr. Floyd Carlton with Mrs. Edward (Imogene) McBurney serving as clerk.

The Beavercreek School has grown over the years and as of the end of the 1982-1983 school year the enrollment is 431 attending the Beavercreek school, while 80 6th and 7th grades attending Moss Junior High school.

To meet the educational needs of those enrolled twenty two classrooms, four offices, a counselor's room, a multipurpose room, a music room, a nurses room, a

gymnasium, four pupil rest rooms, two adult rest rooms, a teacher's lounge, a learning disabilities room, a physical educational room equipped with a shower room for girls and one for boys, along with storage room for the P.E. equipment, a well equipped kitchen with cooler and freezer facilities and five small

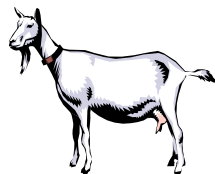

### Oregon City Commission Working to Develop an Opinion to Send to Metro

The Oregon City Commission met for a work session with staff and the Planning Commission on Wednesday, September 18, 2002, in the City Council Chambers at City Hall on Warner-Milne Rd at 5:00 p.m. The meeting was open to the public.

The session was to develop an opinion that the City will send to Metro regarding the expansion of Oregon City's Urban Growth Boundary.

The focus of the meeting was on their own discussion, but the Commissioners took input from the public.

The discussion that pertained to the Beavercreek area was regarding why or why not Oregon City would or would not wish to pick land near Henrici Rd for the expansion of the City's Urban Growth Boundary.

Metro will be giving a lot of weight to what the cities in the current boundary want when it comes time to make its determination in December on which lands should be included in the expansion of Metro's Urban Growth Boundary.

The Commission discussed both the pros and cons of picking land near Henrici Rd for inclusion in the city's Urban Growth Boundary with much input from concerned citizens of the Beavercreek area who were concerned about the impact on our community due to the congestion from the increased traffic and lack of infrastructure to deal with the growth.

Citizens from the Redland/Holcomb area were also concerned about the heavier traffic that would result on Henrici Rd and how it would impact their area.

Due to testimony from the citizenry the Commission realized that they need to work closer with the residents and the communities that their choices will impact.

The South End area of Oregon City and the Beavercreek area received most of the discussion at this meeting. As a result there will be another meeting on October 2, 2002, at City Hall in Oregon City at 5:00 p.m. to further study the Redland/Holcomb area and the concerns of those local residents.

It became apparent to those who attended the meeting that Oregon City is also considering expanding their boundary to include land on the south side of Henrici Rd which is farther south than was previously stated. Up to this point only land north of Henrici Rd had been discussed publicly.

*The residents of the Beavercreek area as well as those who live in the Redland/Holcomb area need to pay close attention to and attend these meetings. Our land is exception land and will be the first land to be studied and very possibly taken into the boundary. It is our responsibility as good stewards of the land to give testimony and make our voices heard in these matters. We need to put the Oregon City Commission and Metro on notice that we are paying attention and making note of how our government is representing the needs and visions of its citizenry. The Editor*

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### Clackamas County Complete Communities Project Wins Public Participation Award

The Clackamas County *Complete Communities* project has won the 2002 Award of Excellence in Public Participation from the Cascade Chapter of the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2). This honor was awarded to the County and to the consulting firm Cogan Owens Cogan for "*excellence in public participation, ensuring citizens have a say in the decisions that affect their lives.*" Earlier this year, Complete Communities was honored with a national award from the American Planning Association.

Since 2000, Clackamas County has undertaken an ambitious effort to engage residents in defining "completeness" for their communities and the County as a whole. "To our knowledge, this is the most comprehensive, successful outreach effort at a county-wide scale undertaken in Oregon, and possibly elsewhere," said Larry Sowa, chair of the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners.

The process has creatively engaged thousands of residents and business owners and improved relationships between the citizens and their government through an open and flexible effort in which everyone's voice was genuinely heard. Participants say they continue to see their input influencing political decisions and increased dialogue with County leadership and staff.

Strategies are being carried out by citizen/staff work groups in these nine areas of emphasis: cultural diversity; cultural opportunities; economy/employment; education; environmental quality; growth and land use; health and social services; parks, open space and recreation; and public safety.

Recommendations from three Community Congresses led to *Connections*, the current phase. The purpose of Complete Connections is to help answer an often-heard concern that citizens, both as individuals and as communities, want to be more involved in decision-making processes that affect their lives.

A citizen Task Force worked with Cogan Owens Cogan for six months on this issue, conducting local and national research on organizational and governance models applicable for Clackamas County and its

unincorporated areas. In keeping with the successful approach of "citizens talking to citizens," Task Force members also helped organize discussions in 27 unincorporated communities about the existing system and how improvements may be made.

IAP2 is an association of members who seek to promote and improve the practice of public participation in relation to individuals, governments, institutions, and other entities that affect the public interest in nations throughout the world. The Cascade Chapter of IAP2 serves Oregon and southwest Washington. 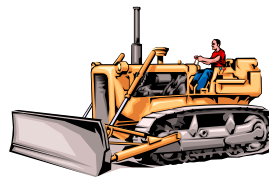

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### Beavercreek CPO Spotlight

The September meeting of the Beavercreek CPO was held on Wednesday, September 25, 2002, at 7:00 p.m. at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Rd with 65 + members and guests in attendance.

Two of the Guests for the evening included Linda Teries and Karen Buehrig Clackamas County Planners, who discussed the proposed changes to ZDO 190, which deals with the subdivision of land. The County intends to assure that the parcels to be included in the Urban Growth Boundary in December are zoned at 20 acre minimum lot sizes to hold the land in large chunks for Oregon City's Industrial needs. The changes to the ordinance will also affect rural zoning and put limits on new schools and churches. Farms, agricultural and timber lands would remain at 80 acre minimums.

The County planning commission will hold a hearing on these issues on October 28, 2002, at the Sunnyside Service Center at 6:30 p.m.

Also attending the meeting were Michael Jordan and Larry Sowa, Clackamas County Commissioners, who answered the members' questions on where the County stood regarding the Urban Growth Boundary move and what their plans were for the Beavercreek area. Mr Jordan stated that he has been on the record as stating that he does not want to see a lot of growth towards the Beavercreek area because there is just no way in and out of the area and it would be a nightmare.

Mr Jordan said that the County Commissioners would be willing to come back to Beavercreek at a later date and discuss any issues that the residents may have. If the citizens told them what issues they were interested in, they could come to the meeting prepared.

There was concern about Oregon City's map of proposed areas, suggested by the planning commission staff, to be brought into the boundary and the fact there was extensive property earmarked south of Henrici Rd.

Oregon City was represented by City Commissioners Doug Neely and Derrick Beneville and a gentleman who represented Randy Nakamoto, Oregon City's Manager.

Mr Beneville stated that Oregon City was interested in the land across the road from Clackamas Community College that runs south along Beavercreek Rd for their Industrial development and that the land south of Henrici was actually suggested by the City Planning Commission.

They said that because the land was layed out on the map did not mean that they would necessarily make the request to Metro for it to be included, but that it was being considered. There was considerable opposition to the inclusion by Oregon City of lands south of the golf course towards Henrici Road (the north part of Area 28).

Mr Neely stated that Oregon City has a certain character and if it continues to grow outward its identity would become diluted.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 23, 2002, at the same place and time. For more

### Rear-End Accident on S. Ferguson Road and S. Ivel

Another example of driving too fast resulted in a rear-end accident on S. Ferguson Road and S. Ivel Road.

The accident occurred on August 5, 2002. at 2:47 p.m. and involved two vehicles.

A 1976 primer black Ford pickup driven by Brandon Jenkins. age 20, of Oregon City, was rear-ended by a 1998 red Honda Civic 4-door driven by Kassie Holman, age 18, of Beavercreek. Luckily neither driver was injured.

Both drivers were northbound on S. Ferguson Road at the time of the crash. Mr Jenkins stated that he was in the process of pulling over and going 5 mph when hit from behind.

At this time Kassie Holman crested the hill and saw Mr Jenkins stopping. She slammed on her brakes. She stated that she was going 45, maybe 50 mph when she saw the pickup. She skidded into the back of the pickup and her car suffered extensive damage to its front end. Ferguson Road is posted at 45 mph.

The officer in doing his investigation of the skid marks on the road found that they were 193 feet long before the impact with the rear of the pickup. He calibrated this to mean that the Honda would have been going in excess of 63 to 68 mph before the impact.

Miss Holman was cited for careless driving in the incident.

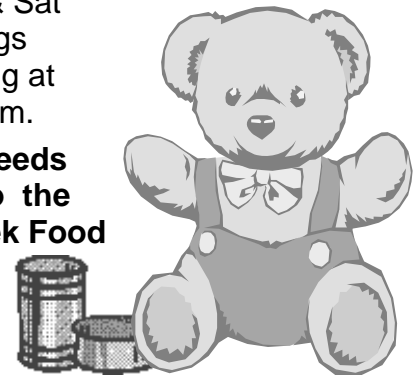
